History of CNI...

“What are the needs of our town and what can the church do to meet those needs?” A simple question with a profound response that launched the work and ministry of Street Angels in Halifax. The Friday and Saturday night binge culture meant thousands of pub goers and clubbers, binge drinking, violence, sexual assaults, under age drinkers gave a general perception that our town was a no go area.

“Could a safe place drop in cafe and volunteer Angels - safe people patrolling the streets - make much of a difference?” Almost eight years down the road and the response is yes - violent crime reduced by 57% in Halifax town centre, thousands of people receiving direct help and assistance, tens of thousands of volunteer hours invested into our local community, an example of partnerships working and a model that is replicated in over 120 towns and cities across the UK

and beyond. Street Angels was not only a good idea - it was a God idea that continues to make the difference...



As other towns and cities (Watford Street Angels was the next to launch in July 2006) saw the potential and links were made with other existing projects (Belfast NightLight and Dundee Street Chaplains), the Christian Nightlife Initiatives Network came into place. A network to: resource; help new works to start; help tell the exciting big nation wide picture of what is happening across the UK.

Street Angels is not a difficult concept - people who care about communities equipped and resourced to do just that. Other local projects, including: night-club

chaplains, lap-dancing bar chaplains, young peoples work, safe places for tea and coffee, homeless outreach and night-shelters, Youth Angels, Club Angels, Club and Pray along with street patrol projects are helping bring massive change in the darkest areas of our night-time economy in the UK and around the world.

Towns, cities, villages and communities can change - **from the binge culture to better** - SA-CNI Network is resourcing and celebrating this...

Street Angels - CNI Network has come a long way in seven years, including winning the Big Society Award in 2012 and a MBE for the founder in 2010. Join us and support us as we commit to the future and to seeing even more communities and people changed...
